# 3Q25 GDP preview: expecting a slower growth trajectory

- We estimate moderation in 3Q25 GDP growth to c.+4.96% yoy as both consumption and investment softened to c.+4.80% and c.+4.22% yoy.
- Strong gov't cons. (c.+33.45% yoy) may lift momentum ahead; higher commodity prices supported export (c.+10.96% yoy) as import were flat.
- We expect FY25 GDP to grow at c.5% on stronger 4Q momentum from government stimulus, rising investment, and steady commodity exports.

## Consumption softening on employment pessimism and late stimulus

We expect Indonesia's 3Q25 GDP growth to moderate to 4.92% yoy vs. 5.12% in 2Q25, as household consumption and investment softened. Household consumption growth is projected at +4.80% yoy, reflecting soft spending momentum, while investment growth is likely to ease to +4.22% yoy after a strong +6.99% in 2Q25. Consumption moderation is due to: (1) declining retail sales (-0.2% yoy in 3Q25), (2) worsening Employment Condition Index (94.3 vs. 97.1 in 2Q25), and (3) lower current income sentiment (117.4 vs. 121.3). Despite the overall weakness, mobility-related indicators remained relatively strong, suggesting that service-sector consumption is holding up. However, services only make up about 32% of total household spending. Gov't consumption is expected to grow sharply by +33.45% yoy, reflecting the acceleration in recent fiscal data. Our spending proxy implies a significant jump in government consumption towards the end of 3Q25, though the impact on households will likely be more visible in 4Q25.

## Investment to decelerate after a strong 2Q

After a strong +6.99% yoy increase in 2Q25, we expect investment growth to slow to +4.22% yoy in 3Q25, weighed by declines across several key proxies. Based on Jul-Aug25 data, government capital spending is estimated to contract -32.5% yoy in 3Q25 (vs. +30.3% yoy in 2Q25), reflecting the uneven disbursement pace. From the private sector, heavy equipment and cement sales are expected to fall by -13.1% yoy and -3.0% yoy respectively (vs. +31.5% and +1.8% yoy in 2Q25). Meanwhile, non-passenger car sales still in contraction but improve slightly (-2.3% yoy in 3Q25 vs. -7.4% yoy in the 2Q25).

## Net Export marched higher on higher merchandise surplus

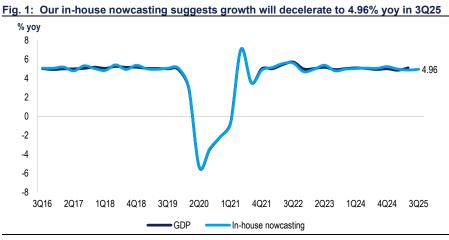
We expect export growth to reach +10.96% yoy in 3Q25F, supported by strong performance in palm oil (volume/price rose +48.5%/+13.2% yoy) and a solid increase in international tourist arrivals (+14.0% yoy/+15.3% qoq) that should narrow service deficit. These gains helped offset the fading front-loading effect seen in 2Q25. Coal price rebounded in Aug25 and stable Iron & Steel export growth also contributed positively. Meanwhile, imports are expected to stay flat at +0.8% yoy, following +11.6% yoy growth in 2Q25, as merchandise imports fell -6.2% yoy in Jul–Aug25 (vs. +9.9% yoy in 2Q25).

# GDP growth to stay at c.+5.0% in FY25

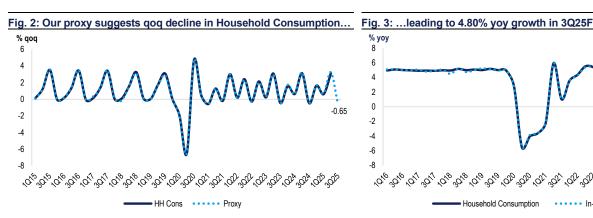
We expect c.+5.0% GDP growth in FY25 with stronger momentum in 4Q25 following a wave of government stimulus rolled out at the end of 3Q. Additional consumption support i.e. 4Q25F social aid of c.Rp37.3tr and potential budget reallocation from underperforming programs, should lift household spending growth to c.+4.9% yoy. On the investment front, government capital expenditure (Rp72.1tr in 4Q25F) and the Danantara project (Rp82-100tr) are expected to boost investment activities. Meanwhile, export performance should remain stable as commodity prices, particularly in palm oil and metal-related sectors are projected to stay elevated through 4Q25.

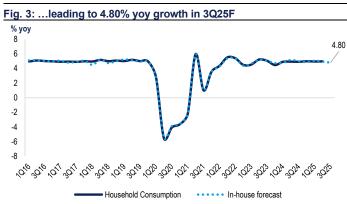

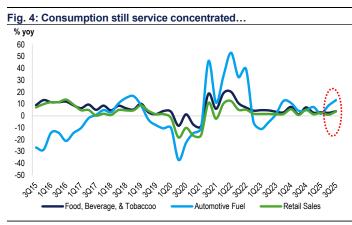

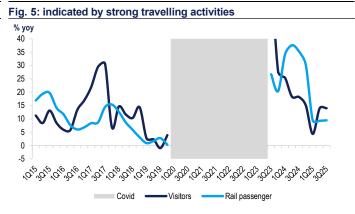

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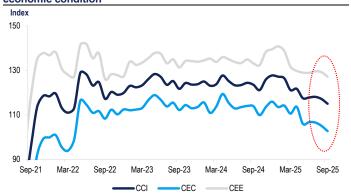

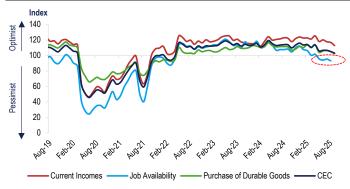

Fig. 6: Sentiment diminished in 3Q, especially on the current economic condition



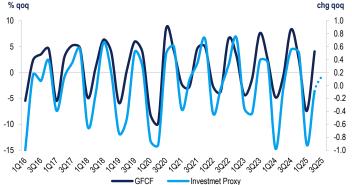

Fig. 7: Pessimism on job availability is worsening, followed by less optimism on current income



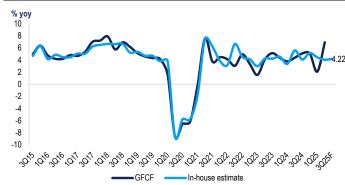

Fig. 8: Our investment proxy suggests higher qoq growth % qoq



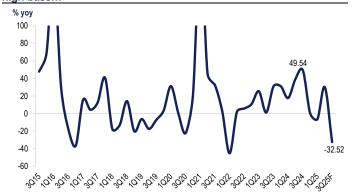

Fig. 9: ...leading to a slower growth of 4.22% yoy in 3Q25



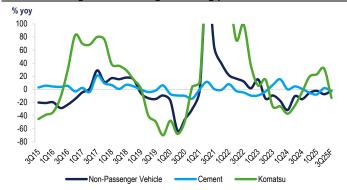

Fig. 10: Gov't capex declined by -32.5% yoy in 3Q25 due to last-year's high-base...



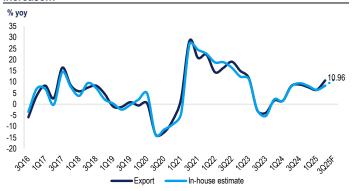

Fig. 11: ...while private investments were declining as well, weighing the investment growth following the strong performance in 2Q



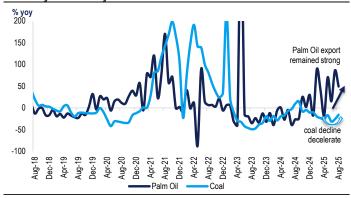

Fig. 12: Export growth to remain robust in 3Q25 with 10.96% yoy increase..



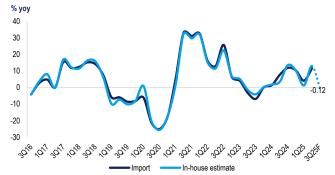

Fig. 13: ...supported by the strong export of Palm Oil and rebound in other key commodity



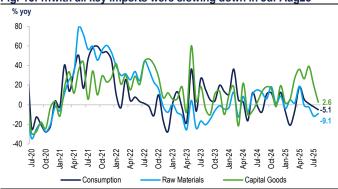
